Vaccinate to protect your whakapapa

Tena tatou,

There are 167 new community cases of Covid-19 in New Zealand today including, 142 in Auckland, 17 in Waikato, 5 in Northland, and one each in the Bay of Plenty, Lakes, and Canterbury DHB areas.

New deaths reported

The two new deaths of patients with Covid-19 were a woman in her 80s who died at Middlemore Hospital, and a man in his 90s in North Shore Hospital. He had been living at the Edmonton Meadows Care Home.

"The man had a number of underlying health conditions and was receiving appropriate ward-level care after being admitted earlier this month with Covid-19.

There are 85 people in hospital with Covid-19, including six in intensive care.

There were [194 new community cases of Covid-19 recorded yesterday](#) - 180 in Auckland, five in Waikato, three in Northland, six in Taupō and one in Tūrangi.

There have been 6334 cases reported in the current community outbreak and 9090 since the pandemic began.

Prime Minister in town to support Tu Mai Tairawhiti- Vax to the Max Campaign.

The Prime Minister and a few of her Cabinet colleagues were in Turanga today supporting the Tu Mai Tairawhiti, vax to the max campaign. As part of the government's vaccination roadshow

Associated Minister of Health Hon, Peeni Henare, hosted a breakfast for Rau Tipu Rau Ora, the Tairawhiti – Regional Leadership Group, Hauora Tairawhiti, Iwi Health Providers, government agency leads and members of the regional vaccination operations group.

The Prime Minister joined him and local MP's, Meka Whitiri and Kiritapu Allan in meetings with iwi health provider, Turanga Health, hosted by CE, Reweti Ropiha and his team and then attended the Ngati Porou Hauora Vaccination Clinic held at the Kaiti Mall.

The Prime Minister spoke with a number of the young Mums who were receiving their first vaccination jab and Downers staff, who stopped in at the clinic to receive first and second vaccine jabs.

Students and staff from Kaiti School provided entertainment, while members of the Tu Mai Tairawhiti events team, handed out gift vouchers and Tu Mai Tairawhiti merchandise. While a small but vocal crowd of 'freedom of choice and anti-vaccers tried to disrupt proceedings, Kaiti Mall locals countered with their own protests, stating 'I am making my stand, my personal choice to protect my whanau and whakapapa'.

Te Runanganui o Ngati Porou Chairman, Selwyn Parata said it's a bit of a check, for people who don't even live in Kaiti to come here and tell the locals what to do, and disrespect our manuhiri, the Prime Minister, and her delegation, in our rohe.

Gisborne Mayor Rehette Stoltz hosted a lunch for the PM and her party with invited guests representing council members and staff, health providers, local GPs and Pharmacists and organisations that had benefited from Vaccination funding recently announced by Peeni Henare.

The PM's last engagement of the day was a brief attendance at the Tairawhiti whanau, hapu, community resilience and preparedness workshop co-hosted by the local CDEM team and local iwi.

In an interview with the Gisborne Herald, the Prime Minister said, "Gisborne is "not much" away from the target of 90 percent first doses, two weeks out from the expected start of the traffic light system.



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She said, "at 84 percent first doses, Tairawhiti is actually only 2500 doses away from hitting that 90 percent target".

"At this stage if the region was still well under the 90 percent target, when most of the country hit their 90 percent target thus triggering the introduction of the Traffic light framework, then Tairawhiti would probably move to the Red setting

The roadshow is part of efforts to support vaccination in Tairawhiti, which remains the lowest region on both first and second doses as a percentage of the population.

Many Māori also live in the region. There are widespread concerns at the lower vaccination rate among Māori, who are at higher risk from Covid-19 and are less likely to engage with the health system [where there are clear inequities](#).

My Vaccine Pass

The Ministry of Health said it's My Vaccine Pass system came under heavy pressure on Tuesday when it was switched on. The number of people attempting to get a pass caused some of the automated controls for restricting access to kick in. These controls are designed to prevent the site being taken down in the event of a denial-of-service attack.

Approximately, 200,000 My Vaccine Passes were processed by midnight on Tuesday. People unable to log in to My Covid Record are asked to please be patient - My Vaccine Pass will not be needed until we move to the Covid-19 Protection Framework.


Regional Update

The Regional Vaccination Operations group will be rolling out Barometers across Tairāwhiti over the weekend, as part of the Tu Mai Tairāwhiti promotions and community engagement plan.

Barometers will be installed in communities across Tairāwhiti from Wharekahika in the north, west to Matawai and south to Muriwai, as well as in the CBD and suburbs such as Kaiti and Elgin.

The Operations group will provide vaccination data, 2-3 times a week to hapu/community leads who will shift the Dose 1 and Dose 2 dials on their barometer to track their progress in achieving their own hapu/community vaccination targets.

Barometers will also go up on digital notice boards in town to track the regions progress in meeting our minimum, 90% Vaccination rate for all eligible Tairāwhiti citizens.

National Update

COVID Protection Framework

New Zealand is moving to a new chapter in its response to COVID-19. The elimination strategy has allowed New Zealand to get to this point, but now it is time to move to a new way of managing COVID-19. The next step in the response is to move the country to the COVID-19 Protection Framework ahead of Christmas.

Cabinet will meet on 29 November to confirm Auckland will move to the traffic light system soon after. Auckland will move to Red. The rest of the country will also move to the new framework.

Places with lower vaccination rates are likely to move to Red. The plan is to get everyone back to a life that is close to normal for vaccinated people while minimising the risks of the Delta virus spreading and keeping vulnerable people and those that can't be vaccinated at the moment, including our tamariki under 12, safe.

The new COVID-19 Protection Framework is designed to give greater protections in a vaccinated environment than with the Alert Level system. This has been made possible with high vaccination rates, and because New Zealand worked hard to keep COVID-19 out of the country for so long.

Auckland boundary restrictions loosened.

From 15 December, people will be able to travel out of Auckland for any reason, so long as they are fully vaccinated or have a negative test result from within 72 hours. There will be spot checks at the boundary from 15 December until 17 January 2022.

Police will have operational discretion on the enforcement of the rules. There will be an infringement fine of \$1000.

Checks for travellers out of Auckland Airport will be done at check-in. Air New Zealand already has vaccination and testing requirements in place. Inter-islander ferries will be allowed to require proof of vaccination or a negative test to travel between Wellington and Picton.

My Vaccine Pass

The My Vaccine Pass is now available. My Vaccine Pass is an official record of COVID-19 vaccination status for use in Aotearoa New Zealand. Anyone aged 12 and over who has had two COVID-19 vaccinations administered in New Zealand, or who has been given a medical exemption, can now request a My Vaccine Pass from the My Covid Record website.

When New Zealand moves into the COVID-19 Protection Framework, My Vaccine Pass may be needed to enter events and venues. More than 60,000 people have already downloaded their My Vaccine Pass.

The International Travel Vaccination Certification is also available from the My Covid Record website. If people are unable to login to the My Covid Record site or are experiencing any other issues with requesting their Vaccine Pass, they should wait for a few days to ease any demand on the IT system and call centre staff.

More than 1300 DHB staff have been stood down as a result of the vaccine mandate.

DHBs have stood down 1309 unvaccinated staff around the country following the new vaccine mandate coming into force.

Lead DHB chief executive Rosemary Clements says DHBs are continuing to consult with those unvaccinated staff members who are stood down to answer any questions they might have, discuss other options such as redeployment, support them through the process and encourage them to consider vaccination. If staff choose to be vaccinated while they are stood down, they will be able to return to the DHB.

Health services delivery impacts will vary between DHBs, and mitigations are in place where needed to minimise any impact to services. These include careful staff rostering, and close monitoring of any areas where there may be some staff shortage. The absolute focus for DHB's is on ensuring continuity of patient care."

Clements adds that DHBs will be in a position early next week to provide an update on the numbers of staff who will be leaving the DHBs due to their unvaccinated status.

"We have given special consideration to the South Island. The combination of the vaccine or testing requirement for Air New Zealand combined with the ability for the inter-islander to operate the same regime will provide solid measures to slow any spread to the South.

Booster Shots

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is said to be aiming to authorise booster shots of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine [for all American adults as early as Thursday](#) (local time).

The move would reportedly expand the number of Americans eligible for additional shots by tens of millions.

The Centres for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) independent committee of vaccine experts have scheduled a meeting for Friday to discuss data on the booster shot's efficacy and safety. If both the FDA and the CDC sign off this week, it will come a little more than a week after Pfizer asked for the authorisation of boosters for everyone 18 and older.

Under that scenario, any adult who had received their second dose of the vaccine at least six months earlier would be officially eligible to get a booster as soon as this weekend.

On Monday, COVID-19 Response Minister Chris Hipkins announced that free booster shots

Mandating COVID-19 Vaccinations for Police

A decision on mandating COVID-19 vaccination for police is "imminent", according to Police Minister Poto Williams.

"The mandating? We are working on that with other ministers right now and decisions on that are imminent, very soon," she told reporters when asked for an update.

"They're very soon, so alongside other ministers, we have to make decisions, but that won't be far away. I've already been on record as wanting to keep the police safe."

School students in Auckland and Waikato are heading back to school on Wednesday, but the return to the classroom has proved contentious for students, parents, and teachers alike.

How the pandemic impacts people's social lives. - AUT Study

A survey of 966 New Zealanders between February and August this year, while the country was at alert level 1, asked how their friendships and social lives were compared to before the pandemic.

The majority (55 percent) said they were "more or less the same", while 26 percent had become less social. Some had decided to avoid large gatherings due to the threat of COVID, while others were unable to see loved ones due to border controls or financial insecurity.

Others said during last year's lockdown they began to "fall out of the habit of socialising" and friendships had been strained, "perhaps because of disagreements over New Zealand's COVID response, or because of resentments harboured against friends who they said had neglected them during the lockdown to focus on life in their own bubble".

"Some however increased the quality of their friendships, focusing on what was important to them."

About 10 percent said the pandemic has inspired them to be more social.

AUT Associate Professor Sharyn Graham Davies says the findings raise important questions about how we can better support people as we emerge from this pandemic.

"This research indicates that even after successfully eliminating the virus many people did not return to life as it was. It was encouraging that some of our respondents built better-quality relationships following the pandemic. However, a significant minority of our respondents reported loss of connections and shrinkage of their social worlds long after elimination had been achieved."

The findings raise concern about the long-term impact of the pandemic on mental health.

"Social connection is a fundamental human need. While some survey respondents report feeling glad to be free of excessive social commitments and obligations, for many others the changes to their social networks appear to be associated with increasing levels of loneliness, hopelessness, and depression.

"One way to avoid the lasting impacts of the pandemic is to have plans in place to reconnect as soon as it is safe to do so."

Funding for Maori Health Providers

Government announced that it had signed contracts worth \$46.75 million, second tranche of a \$60m package announced last month, with Māori health providers to help accelerate the Covid-19 vaccine rollout for Māori. is the.

The money will be divided up between Whānau Ora and iwi providers in the North and South Islands, but most will go to Northland, where 11 contracts have been signed.

The Prime Minister, on a Vaccination roadshow in Gisborne, said 'the gap between general population vaccination rates and Māori vaccination rates had largely closed for older people, but now the job was to give the vaccine to younger people'.

East Coast MP Kiri Allan praised efforts in the community which had resulted in a "huge pickup" in vaccination numbers.

Associate Health Minister Peeni Henare was asked if he had done enough in Cabinet to make sure Māori providers had all the resources they needed. He said "110 percent.

"The reason I say that is at the start of the vaccination process you had to store it a -70C, you couldn't do that in Ruatoria, you could only do that centrally. That's why it took some time to get the infrastructure to become mobile and to be able to take these vaccines to where the people are."

He acknowledged this was being done as early as July and said taking the service to Ruatoria was just the first step.

"Actually, the bigger step is working with our families to make sure that they feel comfortable to engage ... let's be very clear, in Māori communities like this, it isn't about the event, it's about the work that leads up to it."

Māori-Crown Relations Minister Kelvin Davis said Māori providers and organisations were doing the hard yards and delivering, with significant progress made in the past month.

"We are seeing everything from TikTok, kapa haka and music being used to reach rangatahi and our kaimahi are doing the hard yards and door knocking to drum up vaccinations and answer those important questions whānau have," he said in a statement.

Another \$60m was also announced by the government last month to help Māori to protect their communities from Covid-19, with Māori now the group most afflicted by the virus.
